She oversees instruction at the Library, coordinates related assessment projects, manages the Library's presence in Canvas (Learning Management System), and designed and teaches the Library's two credit-bearing courses. She works closely with faculty in a variety of departments, building collections in their discipline areas and creating individualized lessons and learning tools to support their programs, courses, and assignments.

Theresa's campus service includes working on the General Education Task Force, the General Education Course Certification Committee, and the Online Course Improvement Program Advisory Board. She presents and participates regularly at the Teaching Academy and the annual Writing Across the Curriculum workshop.
